Dear Membronian Day. The B This issue of the Gazette contains lots of information about Historic Bristol Day. The BCHF and many



### **CAR SHOW COMING**

BCHF's 14th Annual Historic Bristol Day Car Show is fast approaching. It is scheduled for Saturday, October 18 (no rain date), at the Snyder-Girotti School, 450 Beaver St. in Bristol Borough. Registration on the 18th starts at 9 a.m. The registration fee remains at \$15 for one or multiple vehicles. Pre-registration may be done at bristoldaycarshow.com. No fee is collected until the day of the show. The show is open to the public from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. A car cruise through historic Bristol will take place at 3 p.m. The entire show will be on blacktop, with indoor restaurants, food on the site, and seating. Best of Show and People's Choice trophies will be awarded for both Classics and Antiques. Attendees may vote using their phone or a paper ballot.

This year, as in the past, the show will have a special feature. Bristol's latest project is the Lincoln Legacy Stop. The project is a unique art experience and interactive tribute celebrating Abraham Lincoln's historic visit to Bristol Borough enroute to his 1881 presidential inauguration. Seventy-five feet of railroad track where Lincoln's train stopped have been preserved for years. The project added a train platform, an authentic 33-star American flag, and several figurines which represent the thousand Bristol people who were there when Lincoln stopped. The project's founder, William Pezza of Raising the Bar, will make a special presentation at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m. You will learn how the historic project came about and see the life-size figures come to life as they tell the story, by using a QR code. The project is contiguous to the Car Show.

### **OUT OF THE PAST**

# The following items were excerpted from the Bristol Courier October 1925. Price 2¢

October 1 – Bristol Borough School Board will have a proposition at the general election to approve or reject a debt of \$72,000 to construct and equip an addition to the high school.

October 2 – A Bristolian, Jacob Schmidt a salesman for the Landreth Seed Co. was robbed by three-armed gunman on State Rd. near the Neshaminy Creek.

October 3 – the Travel Club opened the season with a banquet and entertainment at the St. James Parish Building.

October 5 – Nearly 100 Elk and their friends attended the annual outing at Burlington Island Park on Sunday.

October 6 – Applications for new automobile registration plates are being sent to the 1,300,000 car owners in Pennsylvania. The new tags will be orange with blue lettering.

A contract was awarded to build the bridge over the Neshaminy Creek in Croydon for \$95,000. It will be the largest bridge ever built in the County.

October 7 – Bristol League of Women Voters have endorsed the bond issue for the construction at the high school.

October 8 – H. W. Powell of Ohio purchased the old PA Rail Road passenger station. He plans to build a modern gas filling station. This is on the triangular piece of land at Market and Pond St.

Beaver School is to be dedicated on Sat. Oct. 10. It is located in the triangle formed by the intersection of Beaber St. Spring St. and Jefferson Ave. The ground was donated by Joseph Grundy and the building by Angelo DiRenzo.

There are 64 scheduled trolley stops in Bristol daily by the Trenton Bristol and Philadelphia Railway. Trolleys going east and west stop every 30 minutes.

**October 9** – Police recovered 13 bales of cloth valued at \$1300 along Bristol Pike. The material was being shipped to New York from Norristown. It is believed this was a plot to steal the cloth.

October 10 – The State Education Association says only half of the youth between 14 and 17 years old are enrolled in high school.

October 12 – See Gloria Swanson in the movie *The Humming Bird* at the Forrest Theatre on Mill St. on Monday and Tuesday.

It isn't a home without a telephone, and you can have one for less than 10¢ a day.

October 13 – Corson St. and Spruce St. have been macadamed. Race St. will be completed soon.

October 14 – Germany announced adhesion to the Rhine Pact of mutual guarantees with the object of outlawing war.

**October 15** – Pittsburgh Pirates won the World Series in 7 games.

October 16 – The theatre building on Wood St. has been leased to a company to manufacture imitation pearls. Some alterations will be made to the building. They expect to employee 50 girls.

October 17 – The "Human Fly" Henry D. D. Roland treated server hundred Bristolians to a thrill as he scaled the Coleman house on Radcliffe St.

October 20 – Members of the Washington Crossing Park Commission adopted a resolution protesting locating Easter State Penitentiary in Bucks County.

October 21 – The 5<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Bracken Post # 382 of the American Legion was held on Tues. night. A 10-piece orchestra all members of the Bracken Post made its initial appearance.

October 23 – New Nash Special Six sedan - \$1265 and advanced Six Sedan \$1485. See William DeGroot on Jefferson Avenue.

October 24 – Over \$500 in gold will be given as prizes for the Halloween celebration. There will be three prizes in each of 11 categories. The event is conducted by the Mill Street Business Mens Association.

October 28 – a Fire Drill was held and proved that the fire companies are on the job responding quickly.

October 31 – The first snow of the season came as a great surprise covering roads and fields with 3"-5" of snow. Yesterday was the coldest Oct.  $30^{th}$  on record at 32°F.
